
**COUNCIL to DATE:**

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**Council to Date Continued:**

In early September, the Council received notification of the sudden death of the wife to Deputy Grand Knight Eric Cullimore. The Officers and members, and the Parish Community felt the loss of Bridget. At our business meeting a reading of condolence was performed for Bridget ending in prayers. The Knights prayed a Rosary at the visitation and many Knights attended the funeral Mass.

At the 84th Ox Roast, one of our Council Knights had a winning ticket in the main Raffle, new 1st Degree member Matt Clark won Boy's Bike and Judy Woods donated her prize of Girl's Bike for the Annual School Auction and Dave Hall won the fire pit. I appreciate the Knights families for their support in purchasing the Raffle tickets mailed to them.

On the Saturday 15th of September the Council had scheduled a soccer challenge to be conducted at Lansing Catholic High School. Prior arrangements were made with the Athletic Department. Unfortunately, it was cancelled, due to a no show from the Athletic Department to open the padlocked gates to the field. A lack of participation for the event was also noticed. Coach Brian Wolcott apologized for the no show on their part. We are welcomed back for next year to use the field.

Saturday September 22nd. The Walk for Happiness Procession to the MSU Breslin Center. Resurrection was designated as the midpoint of the procession walk. In the planning process, Our Council was appointed the detail of providing guidance and site area observers. PGK Mitch Siminski contacted me in late July with initial planning information of the event and expectations of the Council to perform certain described duties. Buses would be transferring procession walkers from the Cathedral to Resurrections main parking area where staging lines were established. The Council was to hand out water and guide people to porta potties and to Mercy Hall for food snacks. As voted on by the Council, Worthy Advocate David Hall volunteered to provide radios, establish site perimeter observers for overall safety, CPR, and report disruptions on site grounds. This was performed by the 4 BN Michigan Citizens security force, which David is BN Command Sargent Major. Overall the operations were given an approval rating for performance by all involved in the planning and execution of the event. Our Council was given 15 safety vests to retain as a gift from the Diocese of Lansing.

In late September, I was informed by the wife of Worthy Membership Officer, Ricardo Cantu, Jr. that he had received an operation for a heart pacemaker. He is now in healing and has started back to work.

In the Month of October, The Council is looking towards the Thanksgiving, Advent, Christmas and New Year. Funds have been approved and sent for the "Keep Christ in Christmas" annual billboard campaign. On the agenda, is early Christmas Card sales in Mercy Hall on Sundays and a Spaghetti Dinner Fund Raiser for a student school trip in late January. We will also have two Sunday's of a Membership Drive with a table and video information at Cafe' after the 11am Mass.

2019 Membership dues will begin in late November by our Financial Secretary Bill Currie. In closing, I will confirm the Council is current and in "Good Standing" with the Supreme Council.


### **Annual Dues Billing**

# Here's How Much It Would Cost To Replace Your Mom

It's hard to argue with the fact that stay-at-home parenting is one of the most undervalued careers in the U.S.

Moms (and yes, some dads, too) do double duty as chauffeurs, cooks, psychologists, money managers and more, on average clocking a 94-hour work week, according to Salary.com.

Based on the 10 most time consuming tasks listed by more than 6,000 mothers, Salary.com estimated it would cost **\$113,586 a year** to replace them. That's a paltry \$624 (0.5%) raise since the same study in 2012.

To put that in perspective, a physician earns about **\$153,000** for **56 hours** of work per week.

Salary.com also estimated the value of working mothers' household duties, finding they deserve an extra **\$67,436** per year for the **58 hours** of work they take on outside of their 9-to-5 jobs. That's a meager **\$457** raise (0.07%) over 2012.

But here's the sad part -- most mothers don't even give themselves that much credit.

A similar study by [Insure.com](#) found that 11% of women valued moms' household work at under \$10,000 a year. Just 7% said it was worth a six-figure salary.

Insure.com was far less generous with its salary estimate, pinning the 2013 market value of a mom at **\$59,862**, down for the second year in a row.

"Just because someone doesn't earn a salary doesn't mean that they don't make significant contributions to the family that could be costly to replace," Marvin Feldman, president and CEO of the LIFE Foundation, said. "You must think about whether your spouse could afford to pay someone else to provide these services in your absence."

It seems the recession was just as damaging to the stay-at-home parent business as other jobs. This year's salary for moms is well below the **\$138,000** payday Salary.com estimated just six years ago.

At the same time, salaries for various jobs moms perform for their families -- laundry service, household cleaning, financial management, etc. -- declined as well, which explains why studies like these fluctuate with the economy.

When the economy tanked, so did the number of stay-at-home moms. In 2010, there were 5 million stay-at-home mothers (and 154,000 dads) in the U.S., down from 5.6 million in 2007, according to the Fiscal Times. A new survey by [CouponCabin](#) found more than half of working mothers consider themselves the primary breadwinners in their household.

**Mt. Pleasant Sacred Heart graduate Frank Courter was welcomed back by the Irish football team Tuesday. Courter played running back on the 1933 SHA state championship team.**

The 2018 season came to a close Saturday for the Mt. Pleasant Sacred Heart Academy football team as it was upset at home by Brethren 42-26 in its first-ever 8-man playoff game. Yet, that didn't necessarily mean that the 2018 season was really over. On Tuesday afternoon the Irish gathered together once again to welcome in a well-known alumnus in Frank Courter.

Courter was a running back on the 1933 Sacred Heart Academy football team that went 8-0 and claimed the first state championship in any sport in school history. Since then the Irish have competed in 28 state championship games and won 20 state titles.

Courter, who resides in Lansing but has family in Mt. Pleasant, was met by an enthusiastic group of young men and fellow former alumni Mick Natzel, who went on to play with the Oakland Raiders in the NFL. The 101-year old, who graduated from SHA in 1935, chatted with the team for quite some time before checking out the new gymnasium.

He said that during his day the Irish practiced in Island Park, before the pool was installed, and played its games at the high school or at the university. He also said that the team would leave for road games really early on game day because the games were played in the afternoon. He also spoke of his teammates, saying there was no one on the team 6-foot-0 or taller, and coaches.

A game ball commemorating the 1933 unbeaten season was also taken out of the trophy case and presented to Courter.

In the end it was a great day for Frank Courter and a great day for SHA football, which is what it's all about.
